Austin May 1988 First Call

The 1988 National Masters Short Course Championships will be held May 19-22, 1988 at the University of Texas Swim Center in Austin, Texas.

The D C Masters Swim Team will participate.

The Longhorn Masters are the host team. They have integrity and class. I'm sure they will run an outstanding meet. I'm very much looking forward to working with them.

The Lone Star Masters, who represent a geographical area which approximates the entire Northeast of the United States, can also be expected to participate. They are the bad guys.

The D C Masters Swim Team has the rare, very rare, opportunity to march into Texas and beat the Lone Star Masters in their own backyard. And we really ought to do it, because they deserve it. And we can do it.....IF...we sound the Roll Call of Heroes Past (Brey, Gates, Sintz, Flynn, Monsein, Flanagan...the list is endless), and we get a very good response. We may need every single one of you to accomplish this.

Texans can be beaten in Texas, but its not always that easy. Remember, it took 5,000 of Santa Ana's crack troops two weeks to whip 186 of them holed up in a little bend of the San Antonio River in March of 1836. And that's the way they think, and that's where they'll be coming from.

There's only one way to do it, and that's to march in 80-85 strong, a force so powerful that nothing can stand in our way....like Fort Pierce, except we're not going to sneak up or fool anybody this time. We land, blow the Deguello (a Mexican Army bugle call meaning "no-quarter"), and then it starts. No-quarter, no prisoners, no truces to remove the wounded from the field. Sometimes, if you look back, you'll want to get down on your hands and knees and throw up at the carnage and havoc that's been wreaked, but you can't, until the last relay has been swum, the last 1,650 blown out, and it is finished. That's the only way to do it.

And that's exactly what we're going to do.

THE POOL: Incredible! Possibly the fastest in the world. There is no shallow end. It wasn't built for little toddlers learning how to swim; it was built for only one thing, speed. Indoors, so sun and rain aren't a problem. Excellent locker facilities. Mammoth diving pool for warmdowns. Highly visible electronic timing display. Acres of campus adjacent for laying out in the sun.

ROOMS: In their early flyer, the Longhorn Masters have blocked rooms at the Hyatt (\$59 sng/dbl; \$69 tpl/quad), the Four Seasons (\$69 sng/dbl), and the Villa Capri (\$44 p/room)....(If the \$44 price catches your eye, I would only ask that you call me (202) 634-5100 - once, before you make your decision.) With the approval of the Executive Committee, I am in the process of blocking 50 rooms at the Embassy Suites at \$65 per suite. (All rooms at all hotels are plus 13% tax). The Embassy Suites sits on the south side of the Colorado River next to the Hyatt, about a ten minute

drive from the pool. Each suite has a bedroom with two double beds, a TV and a phone; a living room with a TV, phone and a pull-out queen size bed, and a wet bar and a microwave. Also included is a free full breakfast at 6am every morning, and free cocktails in the lobby every evening 5:30-7:30.

All it takes is a phone call (202) 634-5100 to reserve a room at this point. My old direct line number of 634-2939 is being changed; I'll put the new direct line number in the next Wavemaker. The 634-5100 number is a switchboard number. Just leave a message and I'll get back to you. Long distance no problem.

In addition to rooms, I'll be doing the team party, and the team canoe trip. I think both will be a lot of fun. Of course with this being a Presidential Campaign year, I may be making all these arrangements from a cellular phone in Russell, Kansas, but I will make them.

CANOE TRIP: For those of you who don't particularly want to get up and jump on an airplane the morning after the team party, or would like to wallow in the luxury of your Embassy Suite just one more day, or who would like to get a good start on the summer tan, I am organizing a team canoe trip for Sunday, May 22, the day of the 1,000 and 1,650. Breakfast, then leave late morning for a just over one hour drive to Twin Sisters, Texas (which you will drive through but never see), then a three hour run down the Guadalupe River, a bus pickup back to the starting point, and drive back to Austin, arriving around 6-6:30pm. For those of you who have done serious white water canoeing, this is probably not the trip for you. The Guadalupe is a relatively quiet, peaceful little 60-70 foot wide stream, with a handful of very mild, short stretches of white water, including two mildly tiered small waterfalls. The cost is \$20 (plus tax) per canoe. Two people per canoe. The canoe trip is definitely on, barring flood water or thunderstorms, whether we have 4 sign up, or 34. It's just a lot more fun with more people.

EMOTION: Emotion will play a big part in who comes out on top in Austin. And that's why it is so very critical that Jim Densmore attend this meet. I don't see how we can do it without him. Absolutely indispensable! (Linda, if you should happen to read this.....) ..Because, Jim is going to lead the team in all our cheers..Stuff like.....

D C Masters, Number One
New England Masters, Why did you come?
Texas, Texas...where is that?
Lone Star Masters, stick it in your hat!

And many others yet to be written.

WARMDOWN CHUCKLE: I always enjoy chatting with my old buddy Dave Lyons, because he has this uncanny way of putting things in proper perspective. At The Woodlands I was ranting and raving on my favorite subject, the Lone Star Masters, to a captive audience, Dave. I said "Can you imagine a relay where the backstroker lives in Beaumont, and the breaststroker lives in El Paso, and you can't drive in one full day from where the backstroker lives to where the breaststroker lives?".....And Dave said "Sometimes you can't drive across D.C. in a day."

Beautiful.

Senior Olympics

Matila Wins Three Golds In Swimming

ST. LOUIS, July 1—Elsa Matila of Edgewater, Md., won three gold medals in swimming today in the U.S. National Senior Olympics at Washington University.

The 76-year-old won the 50- and 100-meter butterfly races and the 200-meter backstroke in her age group to add to her previous two gold medals and one silver medal.

Baltimore's William Melville Jr. won gold medals in the 50- and 200-meter backstroke in the 65-69 division.

June Gillespie of Rustburg, Va., competing in the 80-plus division, won three medals, placing first in

the 200-meter backstroke, second in the 100-meter backstroke and third in the 100-meter freestyle.

Patrick Frank of Charlottesville won the gold in the 200-meter freestyle in the 70-75 division and took a bronze in the 100-meter freestyle.

Mimi Lee of Silver Spring placed fourth in the 65-69 breaststroke and fifth in the backstroke.

Bill Campbell, former University of Maryland swim coach, placed third in the 50-meter freestyle in the 60-64 group.

In track and field, Anna Chilcoat of Capitol Heights took third in the 65-69 1,500-meter race-walk. Harvey Geller of Greenbelt was second in that event in the men's 65-69 division.

Bernice Kleinschmidt of Annandale took the silver medal in the 65-69 high jump and Alexandria's Jean Campbell was second in the event in the 60-64 division.

Earlier this week, Ed Benham of Ocean City, Md., placed first in the 10-kilometer race in the 75-79 division with a time of 45 minutes 35 seconds. Dorothy Bright of Mount Airy, Md., won that race in the women's 60-64 group in 51:36.

LOCALLY

Twelve world age-group records were broken in the Masters National Long Course Swimming Championships on the weekend in Houston. The D.C. Masters 35-member team, coached by John Flannigan, collected second place overall, behind the Longhorns of Texas.

From the national capital area, Kelly Lemmon set five world records in the men's 75-79 age group: 400-meter freestyle (6:28.92); 200-meter freestyle (2:53); 100-meter freestyle (1:14.86), 200-meter IM (3:30.50); 50-meter butterfly (41.25). Other world records were set by Tom Wolf in the 30-34 division of the 200-meter backstroke, 2:11.77, and Jayne Bruner in the women's 50-54, the 200-meter breaststroke in 3:24.83.

County woman wins masters swimming title

Cindy Collins of Silver Spring won the women's national master's 2-mile lake swim Saturday at Chris Greene Lake, Charlottesville, Va.

With her time of 44:43, Collins edged second-place finisher Suzanne O'Hara of Derwood by 11 seconds for the overall title.

O'Hara finished first in the 25-29 age group title and Collins ranked at the top of the 30-34 age group. Both women are former University of Maryland swimmers.

Barbara Glancy of Chevy Chase won the 55-59 age group title.

In the men's division, Jim Myerberg of Bethesda finished first in the 45-49 age group.

Frank Murphy of Bethesda won the 55-59 age group title.

No times were available for Murphy or Myerberg.

1987 L.C. NATIONALS

Thirty five DC Masters travelled to The Woodlands outside of Houston, Texas and turned in one of the finest performances at a Long Course Nationals since our victory over New England in 1984 at Raleigh. In the combined score, DC Masters finished with 1415 points to place second behind the powerful Lone Star Masters total of 1683.5. With 109 swimmers, Lone Star had over 3 times as many swimmers entered in the meet.

In a repeat of their performance at Palo Alto last spring, the DC Masters women waltzed away with the Division II victory, amassing 537 points. The DC men narrowly missed upsetting Lone Star in Division I, 781.5 - 723.

There were many DC highlights at the meet including a pair of 1-2-3 finishes, 9 individual World Records and 7 relay World Records. The 30-34 women turned in the first sweep with Sue Skiff, Anita Callahan and Elaine Hochuli combining for a 1-2-3 finish in the 100 fly. Not to be outdone, the 30-34 men followed with the same feat in the 400 I.M. with Tom Wolf, Ted Kanamine and Jim Densmore doing the honors. Kelley Lemmon led the assault on the record books with 5 new world marks. Dave Audley and Tom Wolf added a pair each. In addition to his records, Kelley won all six of his events, complementing an identical performance by Jayne Bruner on the women's side.

The women's 25-29 were led by strong performances from Beth O'Connor and Suzanne O'Hara. Beth continued to demonstrate that she is the dominant force in the sprint events, turning in victories in the 50 back and free and once again defeating her nemesis from Central Florida, Rosemarie Seaman. Suzanne added her highest finishes ever at a nationals, breaking the 5 minute barrier while placing 4th in the 400 free and adding a 5th in the 400 I.M. Sandi Ives competed in her first nationals and helped her relays add points for the team in addition to her individual swims.

The 30-34 age group proved to be the most prolific in individual points scored on the women's half (131 points). Karen Sullivan scored her first national title with a victory in the 100 back. She also added a 2nd in the 200. Sue Skiff finished 2nd in the 200 fly in addition to her victory in the 100. Elaine Hochuli, training short course all summer, came through with strong performances, including a second and a third in the 50 and 100 fly. Anita Callahan swam her first nationals in the 30-34 age group (she was overheard wishing herself back into the 25-29 age group). She had several good swims including a 2nd place 100 fly and a 5th in an unusually strong 200 fly field. These four swimmers placed in every event they swam with their lowest finish being an 8th. Karen Davis swam her first nationals as a DC Masters and swam through a shoulder injury for a strong 200 I.M. performance as well as helping out on the relays.

Chris Ruppert-Prosche was our sole representative in the 35-39 age group and came through with 6 strong swims. Her worst finish was a 5th! She turned in 3 2nd place finishes in the 50 and 100 fly and the 200 back. Ann Svanson also scored in every one of her events in the 40-44 age group, sticking around for a 3rd place in the 1500 free and adding a 4th in the 200.

Joann Leilich diversified at this year's nationals and it paid off. In addition to her automatic three wins in the 45-49 breaststrokes, she added a 2nd in the 200 I.M. and a pair of 4ths in the 200 and 400 free. Jayne Bruner overcame an erratic training schedule at high altitude in Mexico to complete a 1st place sweep of all six events she entered in the 50-54 age group. She won everything from the 30 fly to the 200 breast and left her competition out of sight.

Barbara Glancy capped off a hard summer of training with some outstanding performances in the 55-59 age group, capturing 2nd in the 200 free and 3rd in the 800. Lorraine Murphy added a pair of 4ths in the 50 free and 50 fly, competing in the 65-69 age group. Barbara and Lorraine placed in all of their events, which seemed to be a trend established by our women in all the age groups.

Well, what about our men? Not to be outdone by the women, the men turned in an incredible performance as well. Mark Heinrich led the charge in the 25-29 age group, capturing the 50 and 100 back titles. Mark's times in those events were not far off his performances last summer in Tokyo, a remarkable feat as he spent most of his summer moving to Kansas, getting married and going on a honeymoon and other swimming related activities. Kris Weimerskirch swam his first nationals as a DC Master and turned in an outstanding time in placing 3rd in the 200 fly. Kris also scored well in the 100 (6th). Fred Munson also debuted as a DC Master at this meet and finished 3rd in the 1500, his specialty, and added a pair of 7ths in the 200 and 400. Howell Posner posted a fine 800 performance (4th) as well as scoring in the 200 back.

The 30-34 men proved to be the strongest age group on the men's side as well, running up 160 points in individual events. Tom Wolf captured four victories while improving his world records in the 200 back and 400 I.M. Ted Kanamine provided the crowd with something to get excited about as he defeated 1976 Olympic triple gold medalist Jim Montgomery in two of Montgomery's specialties, the 200 and 400 free. Ted added 3 2nd place finishes in the 100 and 200 fly and the 400 I.M. Jim Densmore repeated his 1984 Raleigh performance with a victory in the 200 fly. However, his most shocking performance came in the 400 I.M., where he placed 3rd by dropping 11.3 seconds from his time in Raleigh. There must be something to joining the over 30 crowd. Matt Kanzler made his long course debut in the 30-34 bracket by turning in his master's best in the 100 breast (1:10.95, 4th) and capturing 3rd in the 200. These performances came in spite of light training due to some back injuries this summer.

John Locke participated in his first ever nationals as a participant in the 35-39 age group. He came through in fine style, turning in a pair of 4ths in the 50 and 200 breast and a 5th in the 100. He also proved he is more than a breaststroker specialist as he scored in the 200 I.M. Jorge Gonzalez missed the first day of the meet but stayed for the last and finished 2nd in the 1500 free. Jorge also scored well in the 200 (7th).

The dynamic duo of dueling Daves, Lyons and Audley, provided all the fire power in the 40-44 category. Dave Audley established new world records in the 200 and 800 free and threw in a victory in the 400 for good measure. Must be that fiercesome cap Dave's been sporting lately. Dave Lyon's returned to his roots this summer by focusing on the sprint events, capturing the 50 free and missing victory in the 100 by a mere 1/100th of a second. He also finished 2nd in the 200 free behind Dave Audley and added another 2nd in the 100 fly.

Art Smith and Jim Myerberg led the charge in the 45-49 age group. Art scored well in all 3 backstrokes while also turning in a 4th place performance in the 50 fly. Jim displayed his versatility by finishing 3rd in the 800 free, and 5th in the 200 back and I.M. Lee Bettis turned in scoring performances in the 100 and 200 backstroke. Bill "Magic Hands" Newman sprinted his way to high finishes in the 50 and 100 free (6th and 8th). Dick Cheadle turned in "Best Performance in the Two Most Unrelated Events" by scoring in the 50 fly and the 800 free. Who said you can't mix sprinting and distance. Or is Dick just plain schizophrenic?

Dale McGinley moved up to the 50-54 age group and scored in all six of his events, including a 4th and a pair of 5ths in his specialty, backstroke. He also added a 5th in the 1500 free. John Woods came through with 3 2nds in the 50, 200 and 400 free before claiming victory on the last day of the meet in the 800. John competed in the 60-64 age group and added a 3rd in the 100 back to complement his excellent showing in the freestyle events.

Frank Murphy continued to demonstrate his toughness in the long events by posting a pair of victories in the 400 and 1500 free. His positive attitude also helped him high finishes in the 400 I.M. (2nd), 200 free (3rd) and 200 I.M. (4th). Kelley Lemmon, another DC Master who moved to a new age group this year, swept first in all six of his events while establishing 5 new world records, narrowly missing the 400 free record.

Relays tend to generate the most excitement at nationals and the DC Masters were involved in many close races, emerging victorious 10 times and setting 7 world records. The women got right down to business on the first day with two record setting performances in the medley relays. The 120+ relay of Skiff, O'Hara, Ruppert-Prusche and O'Connor came from

behind to edge Lone Star while the 160+ relay of Bruner, Leilich, Hochuli and Callahan destroyed all their competition. The men came away with a victory in the 120+ medley relay with Wolf, Kanzler, Kanamine and Heinrich defeating Texas Aquatics and Lone Star. The men's 160+ relay of McGinley, Locke, Densmore and Lyons barely missed victory, placing 2nd.

On the second day, the women repeated their performance by capturing the 100+ free relay. O'Connor, O'Hara, Hochuli and Skiff added a world record to round out their performance. Ruppert-Prosche, Bruner, Leilich and Callahan waltzed away with another record breaking performance in the 160+. On the men's side the 100+ (Kanzler, Weimerskirch, Densmore and Heinrich) and the 160+ (Newman, Gonzalez, Audley and Lyons) had to settle for 2nds while the 200+ (Kanamine, Woods, Lemmon and Wolf) ran down the Olympic Club for a narrow victory.

In the mixed medleys, the 200+ relay of McGinley, Leilich, Bruner and Bettis established a new world record while the 120+ relay of Wolf, Kanzler, Skiff and O'Connor defeated Lone Star once again. Two other relays scored well with the 240+ (Svanson, Lemmon, Glancy and Murphy) finishing 2nd and the 100+ (Heinrich, O'Hara, Kanamine and Callahan) pulling in a 4th place in a very strong field.

On the last day of relays, two more world records were set by the 100+ (O'Connor, Wolf, O'Hara and Heinrich) and the 200+ (Lemmon, Callahan, Bruner and Lyons). The 120+ relay of Kanzler, Skiff, Hochuli and Kanamine finished 2nd behind a record setting Lone Star relay. In addition to the record setting performance by the 200+ A, the DC 200+ B (Newman, Ruppert-Prosche, Glancy and Woods) and the 200+ C (Bettis, Ives, Murphy and Murphy) added a 3rd and an 8th in an awesome display of our depth.

Special mention needs to be made of the exceptional relay splits turned in by Beth O'Connor and Mark Heinrich. Both of these DC Masters anchored relays (women's medley and mixed free) that came from behind for world record victories. All in all, the DC Master's performance at The Woodlands was a memorable one and continued to demonstrate that no matter where nationals are held, our team comes prepared for a strong team performance. NATIONAL MASTERS 2-MILE SWIM

Twenty-three DC Masters sauntered down to Chris Greene Lake outside of Charlottesville, Virginia on July 11 to compete in the official national championships for 2-mile swims. As a first time spectator, I have to comment that compete is a mild term for what actually happens at this event. While attempting to survive a 2-mile swim, each swimmer must also demonstrate proficiency in guerrilla warfare tactics. In addition to finishing the race, equal value is placed on minimizing bruises from other swimmers who rationalize kicking and grabbing other swimmers by claiming "I was just passing" or "I can't see in this water".

The DC Masters, who employed more civilized techniques, made quite an impressive showing. On the women's side, Suzanne O'Hara and Beth O'Connor placed 2nd and 3rd overall while finishing 1st and 2nd in their 25-29 age group, respectively. Suzanne missed the overall victory by a close twelve seconds. In the 19-24, Pam Locke, Sharon Leilich and Allison Widmann accomplished DC Masters only 1-2-3 sweep in the event. Martha Williams added a 4th in the 25-29 to round out a 1-2-4 finish while Ann Svanson and Sue Herrington finished 1-2 in the 40-44. Other high finishers included Elaine Hochuli (4th, 30-34), Joanne Leilich (2nd, 45-49) and Barb Glancy, victorious in the 55-59.

The men were also up to the challenge. Two Daves, Audley and Hicks, combined for a 1-2 finish in the 40-44. Jim Myerberg, Art Smith and Lee Bettis combined for a 1-3-4 showing in the 45-49. Other strong performances were turned in by Jorge Gonzalez (3rd, 35-39), Dale McGinley (4th, 50-54) and Frank Murphy, who walked away with victory in the 60-69 by 11 and 1/2 minutes. Jorge's 5th place overall was the highest finishing DC Master.

All in all, it was a typical fine showing by the DC Masters. The race was followed by an awards ceremony and cookout. For those of you motivated to try this race next year, the rest of the lake's facilities are open during the meet which makes for an enjoyable morning for the whole family. NATIONAL SENIOR OLYMPICS By Mary Lathram

Five members of the DC Masters traveled to St. Louis the last week of June to attend the first National Senior Olympics. Participants could qualify by placing in their State Senior Olympics in any of eleven sports, or by meeting certain standards of achievement. There was wide variation in the amount of support offered to would-be participants by the various states, and one often heard remarks such as "but our state never told us that". The overall effort was a grand one, however, and we who went wouldn't have missed it.

Out of a total of 3000 competitors, 950 entered track events, 600 were swimmers and the rest participated in archery, bowling, cycling, golf, horseshoes, tennis, table tennis, 10K road race, or volley ball. The Stanford meet this year registered the largest number ever at a Nationals, but St Louis had more in those 55 and over age groups.

Those Masters Swimmers who attended showed up well, but we were astonished to find that many top place winners were not Masters members. In our DCM group, Bert Kassell, a strong contender in his 70-74 age group, entered 9 events and placed from 7th to 14th. Of 45 swimmers in the 50 freestyle in his age group, he placed 9th. Nancy Clark in her usual fine style won a gold and three silvers. Mimi Lee won two fourth places, one fifth and one sixth. She won a fine trophy in badminton which was an exhibition event this time but will be one of the regular sports in the next National Senior Olympics. Mary Lathram placed from 4th to 12th in the seven events she entered. Elsa Mattila was our star winning 5 golds and one silver. The golds, of course, establish records for the first ever national competition.

If you seniors are embarrassed at picking up a gold because you are the only one in your age group, if you enjoy challenging competition and a warm spirit of fellowship, then look for announcements of the next US National Senior Olympics to be held in 1989, and plan to be there.

For the first time, the DC Masters have come out victorious in the Hawaiian Relays with 384 points. The Humu Team was second with 243 points. third place San Diego Masters had 124 points. Congratulations to all forty participants, team captains, and meet volunteers.

I'm sure that this team will be back gunning for the records next year. The men's 35-44 team did very well this year. Captain Sandy Brown, Dave Lyons, Steve Hogan, Steve Harrison, and Stan Oaks faced close competitions from several teams, but came through to win three events.

Although last minute injuries prevented the usually strong 55-64 women from fielding a team, Minna Hamner, Betty Griffin and Barbara Glancy joined forces with Joann Leilich to swim 45-54 relays and capture 27 points. the 65 and over women, recruited by Lorraine Murphy, as usual did well-winning five relays. Glad to be joined by Elsa Mattila this year were veteran Hawaiian Relays swimmers Mary Lathram, Nancy Pessel and Mimi Lee. A special thanks goes to 45 and up men's captain Dale McGinley who gathered a team from this busy age group. He, Ray Chen, Art Smith, Lee Bettis, Don Walter, and Bob Parke earned five second places.

This meet is run informally, which makes it difficult to run. This year's meet, however, was make much easier with the help of co-meet manager Sandy Carey and the many people who just came out to time and referee. On June 14, ten DC Masters traveled to Annapolis for the annual "bay swim". There were 415 swimmers entered, 371 started the race, and 351 completed the course that totalled 4.35 miles. The conditions for this years race were said to be ideal, with warm air temperatures, relatively calm waters, and quite tolerable water temperatures. In spite of a late start (due to nature's call), Mark Heinrich was the top finishing DC Master placing 7th overall and 2nd in his age group (25-29). He finished the course in 1:36:45. Pam Locke was our first women finisher, she was 32nd overall and 2nd in her age group (20-24), and the 6th women finisher. Elaine Mochuli had a glorious swim, she said she felt strong the entire race with seemingly endless energy throughout the swim.
